Gardener's Corner

The New Year is upon us as we spin our way back toward the sun and its warmth. Hibernation and planning are the mainstays of January, apart from forays into our gardens to check on the health of over-wintering plants.

Look for vole damage around the base of trees and shrubs where these little varmints gnaw at the bark and can quickly girdle a favored plant. Protect with wire mesh if needed.

For heavy snowfalls gently brush snow from laden tree branches with a broom, but never try to remove ice-encrusted formations, as breakage will likely occur.

Broad-leaved evergreens such as rhododendron and mountain laurel can become desiccated in the severe, drying winds of winter. Rhododendrons will curl closed in extreme cold in order to conserve moisture and unfurl when the temperature warms. There are commercial anti-desiccant sprays available, but they usually are applied in the fall when the temperature is above freezing. If you notice browning and extreme drying, try wrapping the plant in burlap to buffer the effects of the wind.

Garden catalogs are filling our post boxes and provide hours of happy dreaming. Perennial, annual and vegetable gardens expand and unfold in our imagination as we plan our next gardening season. Whether you're starting something new or revamping the old, keep in mind guidelines for zone hardiness, light and moisture requirements for new additions to your garden. Consider buying locally raised plants because they tend to be healthier, hardened to local conditions and are not stressed by being shipped barerooted. It's a greener alternative to long-distance shipping and it supports our community. Many local nurseries now have websites for your perusal.

Trends continue toward the use of low-maintenance and drought-tolerant plants as well as native plants for their adaptability to local conditions. It is hard to predict what weather to expect next summer as the climate continues to offer unusual patterns. Drought and heat contrast with summers that can be cool and rainy. Darwin's theory applies to our gardens as to animal adaptation: only the fittest shall survive - all else ends up in the compost heap!

Stay warm, curl up in your favorite chair with a steaming cup of tea, coffee or cocoa, enjoy a good garden book to dream your way through winter into spring.

The Food Pantry is supported by individuals, schools, churches and businesses donations of food, funding, and teams of volunteers to pack and distribute food.

Along with government support, the

program continues to need community support to serve the growing number of hungry families in the nine Hilltowns they serve. For every dollar donated, 97 cents goes directly to food. And the Pantry relies on volunteers from the community and multiple area churches.

Selectboard Reminds Residents Winter Road Rules

In these difficult economic times, the Selectboard reminds Conway residents that, in the event of snow, you can help our road crews keep to their tight budgets and schedules by following the Winter Parking Ban policy, and being patient as they work to clear the roads.

A town-wide winter parking ban is now in effect through April 1, 2013, between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. During these hours, on-street parking on public roadways is not permitted. In addition, vehicles should be removed from public roadways during daylight hours, in "inclement" weather or stated snow emergency. Failure to follow this policy may result un a fine of up to \$300.

The Selectboard also reminds residents to clear driveways and private roads of snow and ice, to provide access to emergency vehicles. Please allow our fire, police and ambulance personnel to do their job of protecting everyone.

United Congregational Church of Conway Restoration Update

The United Congregational Church of Conway church building is on the road to recovery. Thanks to kind donations, and community support in the form of CPA funds, the mold inside the church building is gone and the air is free of mold and other contaminants.

Before we can complete the interior work, we must ensure that the issues which allowed the contamination, following Irene, don't occur again. With winter breathing down our necks, we are grading to prevent future moisture infiltration. December's scaffolding allowed the steeplejack to do his work and prevent future roof leakage. The outside carpentry work is in its final stages.

In the months ahead, we will concentrate on inside work involving the foundation and ceiling. With walls pulled out for the mold remediation, we can also work on insulation, electrical and plumbing upgrades, heating improvements and a kitchen redesign to make the building more useful for community events.

Next and finally, we will concentrate on the final carpentry, painting and floor restoration that we hope, in 2013, will bring back Conway's community church.

Dedicated Volunteer Needed for Conway Mall

For the past several years, Paula Boulanger has provided the service of managing the Conway Mall, but beginning this March, we need a new manager. Her service will certainly be missed.

This is a flexible volunteer position requiring organizational skills and a willingness to work with the public. Paula is willing to train her replacement. if you are interested, you are invited to call her at 369-0132.

The Conway Mall has been an important part of the town's recycling program for more than a decade, cutting several tons from our refuse and disposal costs. During the years that weights have been tracked at the mall, more than 7 tons of reusable materials were recycled there annually. That fact aside, the mall has also been an important resource for many Conway residents.

The old "swap shop" originally came under the direction of a volunteer manager in December 2000 when Carolyn "Sparkie" Hill went to the Board of Health to express her concern that the facility was being underutilized. She was given leave to organize colunteers to sort and remove items that were soiled or beyond reasonable repair. To make the vlume manageable. good items that did not seem to be moving were donated to a charitable group of the managers choice.

Through the years there have been many different managers of what eventually became known as the Conway Mall. If you have been a mall patrol through the years, you have probably noticed that each manager has left an imprint on the operation. perhaps it is your turn to make a mark.
