Special State Senatorial Primary Election on April 30th

Polls for the special Primary Election will be open at the Town Hall, 5 Academy Hill Road, from 7 AM until 8 PM on **April 30th 2013**. Voters intending to cast their ballot in Conway must be registered and/or make any party changes **before 8:00 PM on Wednesday, April 10th**.

Anyone planning to cast an absentee ballot for the election is reminded that applications must be

filed before noon on the last business day before the election, and received prior closing of the polls.

Registration for the annual town meeting and the town election will fall just 7 days prior to the Primary, but remember: though the town session is held in advance of the Primary, **it will not make a new (unregistered) voter eligible to vote at the Primary.**

Every time her neighbor would hang her wash to dry, the young woman would make the same negative comments.


About one month later, again while the couple was eating breakfast, the woman looked out the window ready to complain, but instead her mouth

Gardener's Corner

At last, our gardens are waking from their long winter's sleep! First to emerge are early bulbs like crocuses, snowdrops and miniature daffodils. Species tulips also bloom early and while they are lovely, they are seldom seen in catalogs.

Most of the familiar, large tulips we know today were hybridized from species first brought from Asia Minor to Europe in the mid-1500s. Tulipmania, which occurred in Holland in the 1630s, was a speculation boom and bust based on these exotic blooms favored by the rising merchant and elite classes. While native species continue to grow in the wild today, only recently has interest in these lesser known tulips grown. Bulb producers are now selecting promising candidates for commercial sale, but please note that it is important to buy only bulbs that have been propagated in nurseries using protocols that preserve the wild colonies.

Most species tulips grow less than a foot tall with small cup-like blooms, many bi-colored with contrasting "eyes" at the bottom of the cup. Foliage can be long and thin or wide, mottled with mahogany-purple. They require well-drained soils and the

alpine types prefer rock-garden settings with several inches of stone gravel above the bulbs. If given ideal conditions, they can live for years, spreading by bulb-lets or self-sown seed.

Tulipa greigii and *T. kaufmanniana* are probably the most commercially available of the species tulips. Under 10" with wide, squat leaves, many burgundy-striped, they are topped with bright single or clusters of coral, pink to red blooms. Hardy in most soils, good drainage is essential. *Tulipa tarda*, only 4-6" tall, offers butter yellow blooms with white tips and is fairly easy to grow. Even smaller, at only 3-5" tall, *T. pulchella* has delicately scented, violet purple flowers. Giant in comparison at 10-12", *T. clusiana* sports pink blossoms with white interiors and a central red 'eye'. *T. turkestanica*, 5-8" tall, offers clusters of 3-5 creamy-white flowers per stem. *T. linifolia*, 4-6" tall, is bright red. Growers also offer dazzling species hybrids, calling them "botanical" tulips. One striking example, *T. 'Little Beauty'*, possesses vivid pink blossoms that open to expose a violet eye rimmed in white.

Look for these garden gems when visiting public or private gardens this spring and when you plan next fall's bulb planting, keep in mind these sweet harbingers of spring.

The pool was closed two years ago because of a failure of the dam. Since then, the Conway Swimming Pool Committee has been working tirelessly to complete the repair. They've faced countless environmental, permitting and engineering obstacles, and now are ready to repair the pool.

The cost estimate for the repair is an astounding \$327,410 but with the help of the sale of a Conservation Restriction and a fund drive we've raised \$240,000. We still need to raise \$87,000 by May 1st so we can repair the pool this summer. We need your help to finish our fundraising so we can all be swimming again. becoming a pant

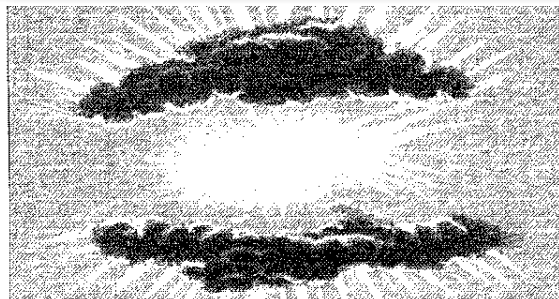
Dark eyes wide and so bright reflect the

Another Thanks From the Assessors

The return of the personal property forms is about 60% - one of the best years ever!

The next step in revaluation is to review the property sales in the past two years, from 1/1/2011 to the present day. Each sale is examined to make sure it was a valid, “arm’s length sale” (this basically means a willing buyer, willing seller, no unusual pressures on the agreement or in the financing, reasonable exposure on the open market). The arm’s-length sales reflect the true market value of property in Conway.

Many of you will have visited with assessor Malcolm Corse on his Monday-morning travels around town, taking new photographs of properties and checking our data. In addition to going to any properties that have had a structural change, we revisit 1/6 of the town each year to keep our data current and accurate. As part of the sales review, our local advisor from the Department of Revenue will be driving around Conway in early April. He takes about 100 property record cards (for all of the sales, the assessors’ properties, some random choices from

each group —single-family, trailers, multi-family, commercial, industrial, etc.) and stops on the road in front of the property to check the information on our card against what he sees, verifying the quality of the data we use for valuing each property.

Arm’s length sales tell us if our present values are high, low or right on the market values. We use vacant land sales and break out the land from the buildings in other sales to set next year’s values for land in Conway. All of the structures that sold are reconsidered as well, using their age, quality, and condition to test out taxable values per square foot for accuracy against the market. The Dept. of Revenue requires the new taxable values that we set on the houses that sold are required to be within 10% one way or the other of the adjusted selling price (20% for vacant land). This validates the over-all values applied to every property. We aim for a 5% margin from market and have been valuing at about 97% of selling price for the past several years.

More next month – spring may be here by then!

Field Library: Your Conway Resource

The **Field Memorial Library** is open on **Wed. from 3 to 8 PM** and on **Sat. from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.** We have a good selection of popular new books and current magazines, a growing collection of audio-books, and a wide variety of movies on VHS and DVD.

The lending period is two weeks with a fine of 15¢ per library day for overdue items. Renewals may be made by phone at 369-4646. There is a book drop next to the front door if you can't return during library hours. Please band or bag items to prevent damage.

Titles not owned by the library may be ordered through Inter-library Loan. These items must be returned to Field Memorial Library by the due-date on the lending slip to allow time for processing and transportation.

The Field Memorial Library-A Cool Classic

“The finest small library in New England,” that was how Marshall Field in 1899 described the stone library he wanted to build at the end of Main Street in Conway. By then, Field had long since left behind his family’s farm on Field Hill and gone to Chicago, where he had built the nation’s largest and most sumptuous department store. Field had also partnered with John D. Rockefeller to build the University of Chicago, and would leave \$8 million to found the Field Museum of Natural History. But he said that the library in Conway was the project that gave him the most pleasure. It was intended as a memorial to his parents, whom he credited with his extraordinary rise to success.

The Field Memorial Library, with its stately columns and lofty copper dome, may have seemed out of place in rural Conway, with its dirt roads and simple frame farmhouses, but it was very much in keeping with the thinking of the time about buildings that housed cultural institutions. An 1899 article in Greenfield’s Gazette and Courier stated, “The beauty of the buildings, and surroundings are designed by Mr. Field to be no less educational and conducive to the permanent benefit of Conway than the library advantages which are its original reason for being.”

The huge success of the World Columbian Exposition in Chicago in 1893, under the direction of Daniel Burnham, had given classical architecture new luster. Field,

one of the fair’s major supporters, witnessed the enthusiasm of thousands of visitors who came to see the miniature city of classical buildings and gracious grounds. He wanted his native town to share in this cultural moment. The architects whom he hired to build his library in Conway, Shepley, Rutan, and Coolidge of Boston, had already created other major public buildings, and the builders, Norcross Brothers of Worcester, were then working on the construction of the New York Public Library.

To bring the great stone blocks from the train station at the South River, special tracks were laid from the trolley stop at the head of Main Street to the construction site (which had been cleared by moving two houses across the street). To dig the trenches that would hold the immense weight of the library, workers had to go ten feet below the basement to get a firm foundation. The entire project, completed in 1901, cost \$86,500. The library archives have copies of twenty-two of the original construction drawings.

A first-time visitor who has climbed the broad granite steps and entered the great rotunda lined with columns of Brescia marble will sometimes pause for a moment, gazing upward to the skylighted dome.

One murmured, “Cool.”

Town Readies for Annual Meeting May 13th

A bylaw change voted in the fall of 2011 moved our annual town meeting and election to **Monday, May 13th, at 7:30 PM.** The Town election will follow on **Thursday, May 16th.** Both meetings will be held at the Conway Grammar School.

Unregistered Conway residents must register before 8PM on **Tuesday, April 23rd.** To accomodate this, the Board of Registrars will hold special hours in Town Office Building from 9AM until 8PM that day. Residents registering by mail must have applications postmarked prior to the registration deadline.

The last day to submit articles for the Town Meeting warrant is **Thursday, April 18th.** Your article must be signed by at least 10 registered voters, and must be certified by the Town Clerk.

Emergency Pet Preparedness

The Regional Preparedness Program of the Franklin Regional Council of Governments (FRCOG) is encouraging all pet owners to consider preparedness for their entire household, including furry, flying, and slithering friends.

Nina Martin-Anzuoni, who coordinates Franklin County's Disaster Animal Response Team (DART), says there are several steps pet owners can take to ensure their whole family is safe. "Start by making sure your pet has proper identification, so if they are lost you can be reunited more quickly, and then put together the basics, such as three days of water for each pet and at least three days of food in airtight, waterproof containers," says Martin-Anzuoni. She also encourages people to keep copies of their animals' medical records and, if possible, an extra supply of whatever medicine each pet may need in a waterproof container. Keep these supplies together in a backpack or something similar, which will allow for quick retrieval in the event of an evacuation.

"It's important to consider the special needs of your pets and whether their health and safety would be compromised in a power outage, which can result in extreme temperature shifts," says Martin-Anzuoni. In recent disasters, such as the October 2011 snowstorm, many homes were without electricity for

Burning Season Reminder

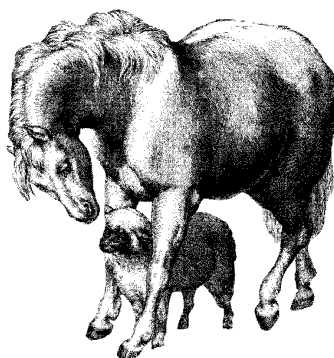
Open Burning Season in Conway runs **until April 30**—the end of this month! Residents must have a permit to burn.

In accordance with this, the BOH has recommended: **Anthony Borton**, Barn Inspector, who will check on the health and welfare of all livestock housed within the town, and **Joseph Colucci**, Quarantine Officer, responsible to follow up on incidents involving possible communicable diseases among the animal population.

She recommends researching local and regional boarding facilities, talking with friends and family who might provide a safe haven, and considering back-up power sources for your home, if that is an option.
