CONWAY OUTDOOR LIFE



Being human, gardeners make mistakes. Generally, mistakes can be corrected; we move plants, try something new. The point is the learning process, which helps us expand our knowledge. Sometimes, our mistakes are not easily erased or fixed, and each year they get worse and worse. The subject here is GARDEN THUGS: Plants that come to stay and try as we may, we cannot eradicate.

As a seasoned gardener, you have probably happened across one or more of these. If you are just starting out in the world of gardening, the advice that follows can relieve you from countless hours of frustration and hard work.

It usually starts innocently enough. You see a pretty little plant, usually in a 2 ¹/₂" pot(!), and you fall in love with its variegated leaves or gorgeous flower. You plant it in your garden, and for the first year or so, all seems fine. Then you notice in subsequent years how it seems to be crowding its more demure neighbors. Next thing you know, it has overrun the whole bed! The question to ask the source of any plant is, "Is this stoloniferous?" The answer will tell you exactly what you're dealing with. A plant that spreads by stolons (specialized underground roots that radiate outward, sending up new plantlets) will most likely become a problem in a garden bed.

If you really want one of these plants, I suggest burying a large pot in the ground up to an inch of its rim and planting the "thug" inside. Annually, dig up and divide in half, replant and trash the other half or give away with the warning to corral it. If you try to compost it, it will most likely grow.

Some plants are worth this hassle: mint, beebalm (most members of the mint family. Labiatae, will be aggressive) and yarrow come to mind. I happen to love the silver leaves of artemisia and find their stolons easy to rip out of the garden. Lily of the valley is rampant in a couple of my beds, but as my favorite scent. I forgive it. When a plant is labeled groundcover, it will be aggressive! Goutweed, non-clumping Bamboo, Polyganum, Polygonatum or Houttuynia, DO NOT plant! Will Conway residents rise to the Chesboro Challenge? Can your team hit strange balls with strange bats and win?

The First Annual Chesboro Challenge on **July 4th** is intended to be a fun-filled family affair. Six teams of 12 members, will compete, each comprised of Conway residents and their friends. Teams will include players from age 7 to 80+. Players 18 years and younger musy have their parent's permission. Players do not have to know how to play "crazy ball" or soft ball. Adjustments will be made at the time of play to help the novice become an expert.

If you will be 18 years old on or before 25 June 2013, you may register now for the coming election.

Time Running Short

It's June – the last month to register your dog for 2013 without paying a fine. State law requires that dogs be licensed each year and your 2012 license expired on 31 March 2013. The town of Conway gives you a three month grace period to register or re-register.

Licenses are available from the Town Clerk. You may also purchase licenses by mail at *Dog License*, *P.O. Box 240, Conway*. Please include SASE with 66¢ postage. Make checks payable to the Town of Conway – Males and Spayed Females are \$3.00 each; Females are \$6.00 each. The following information must accompany all requests: Owners name and address, Dog's name, age, breed color and gender; a current rabies certificate. Proof of a current rabies vaccination is required!!!

As of this writing nearly 1/3 of the town's 554 known dogs have been registered. After July 1, owners are subject to a \$10.00 fine in addition to the regular licensing fee for each unregistered dog in their household.

Swimmingly Sensational Saturday on May 11th was an unbelievable success! The silent auction. tag sale, basket raffle, bake sale, and concerts raised over \$15,000 in one day!!! It was only a few months ago the Pool Trustees were wondering how we would raise over half a million dollars required for this project and we are a shy **\$25,000** away from our estimated construction cost goal. The residents of Conway have shown an overwhelming interest and heartfelt support for the pool. Many that have given even returned multiple times to give more. Thanks to all who donated auction items, tag sale items, baked goods, basket raffle items, played in the concerts, volunteered at organizing and events, and continue to make donations!

The "Making a Splash" CD is available for only \$10 at different locations in town and will continue to be sold to raise additional funds. Dave Balkema is also selling Frisbee Golf Discs that have "Save the Conway Pool" embossed on them and will be holding a tournament in the upcoming months.

The Pool Trustees are getting very close to final project plans, permits, bidding, and construction. All but one permit is in place and we expect to have it by July and begin dredging and dam repairs. Regulations require that construction be completed between July and September, so we have a very short time frame and cannot begin earlier or extend beyond that time.

Excuse us during the next month as we pound the pavement concentrating on the details and keeping the project on track and within budget. This may mean fewer updates and less communication, but only because we are very, very busy. We'll try and update the website as we can.

Challenging Opportunity on the Board of Health

The annual town election failed to produce an elected Board of Health member to fill a vacancy existing since July 1, 2012. The BOH continues to search for an individual to fill the vacancy. Becoming a member is a worthwhile and challenging way to be involved in community affairs. The Board of Health performs duties pertaining to the protection of public health, the control of disease, the promotion of sanitary living conditions and the protection of the environment. In Conway, areas of involvement include managing the Transfer Station, inspecting food establishments, overseeing installation and inspection of septic systems, and supervising animal safety issues.

Eating Around Town

Orchard had a retirement party that was a potluck up at Norm's house. Everyone outdid themselves with delectable dishes. This was a favorite and great for the summer!

2 cups soy sauce ¹/₂ cup Mirin (good soy sauce) ¹/₂ cup Saki ¹/₄ green apple, shredded 1 oz ginger sliced (or powder) ¹/₄ cup water 3 Tablespoons of white sugar 4-5 pounds of beef ribs, boneless

Boil all ingredients together (except ribs) and reduce to $\frac{1}{2}$. Simmer for 15 minutes on low and about another

15 minutes until reduced again in ¹/₂. Place ribs in large zip lock bag. Add marinade. Make sure to get out all of the air before sealing the bag. Marinade ribs for at least 2 hours, turning bag occasionally. Cook ribs on the grill until charred the way you want them. Add toasted sesame seeds just before removing from grill if desired. Best when eaten among friends! Bon Appetite!
